## **EMBLEM**

### **EMBLEM SIGNIFICANCE**

The Supply Squadron emblem is symbolic of the Squadron's mission as part of the U.S. Air Force. The gold field which indicates the excellence required of assigned Air Force personnel, the blue chevron, engrailed to symbolize clouds, refers to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations, and simulates an airplane in flight. The alternating squares signify the many and varied aspects of supply. The star alludes to Minnesota, the North Star State.

## **OPERATIONS**

The unit was called to active duty on 1 March 1951 as a result of the Korean conflict. The authorized strength was 7 officers and 126 airmen, although the assigned strength was 6 officers and 50 airmen.

The unit was returned to state control on 1 December 1952. The Commanding Officer was Victor C. Johnson, and the unit had an authorized strength of 7 officers and 103 airmen.

On April 1956, the unit was deactivated by General Order #17, AGO Minnesota, with an assigned strength of 8 officers and 100 airmen. Its duties and men were assigned to the Support Squadron.

The Supply Squadron is composed of the following functional sections: Squadron Section, Material Facilities, Management and Procedures, Supplies Management, Equipment Management, Item Accounting and Fuels Management.
