OPERATIONS

The primary function of the Resource Management Squadron is to supply the Group with the material needed to accomplish the mission. In addition to managing the unit's physical property from clothing to aircraft fuel to spare parts ... the squadron also provides accounting and payroll services plus logistics plans. Also operating in the squadron is base procurement, the Comptroller's office, war-readiness supplies, vehicle maintenance, and all freight and passenger movement. Membership in the Resources Management Squadron is 120 enlisted and 9 officers. The Squadron also occupies three buildings in the Air National Guard complex: #79. the Squadron Headquarters and warehouse building, the Fuels Management building, and the Vehicle Maintenance/Motor Pool complex.

The Motor Pool, formerly assigned to the 193rd Combat Support Squadron was reassigned to the 193rd Resource Management Squadron in mid 1982.

The spring weather brought about a flurry of outside construction work. The Resource Management Squadron building reached a 55% completed stage by March while ground was officially broken on 29 March 1985 for the Civil Engineering Squadron and Group Fire Station. Meanwhile most of the design work had been completed on the Group's headquarters and training building which will house the dining facility, band practice area, a complete television studio, the TAG Hospital, and other Combat Support Squadron and Special Operations Group offices. This building will be constructed in the grassy area between the vehicle compound and the Squadron Operations building. 1985

By the middle of July, the new Resource Management Squadron building was 76% complete with a fall dedication planned. Meanwhile, the 193rd Civil Engineering Squadron building was beginning to rise from its freshly poured foundation footings.

The official ribbon cutting for the \$2.4 million Resource Management facility came in September as the building was dedicated in a ceremony at which time Maj Gen Richard M. Scott, State Adjutant General, received the ceremonial building key from the contractor. The newest building in the Air Guard complex features many innovations like a double-door dock receiving area, a wind-around ramp at the west side of the warehouse for greater ease in delivering pallets to aircraft, and ours is one of the only two guard units in the country to have a rotating supply carousel holding up to 9,000 supply parts.
