### **EMBLEM**

On a disc Sable, a mountain range in base Vert charged with a demi-globe Azure gridlined Argent with center of the second; in chief a bugle Proper detailed Golden Orange suspended by a braid of the third, in sinister side a polestar of the fifth; all within a narrow border Yellow. Attached above the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "FRONTIER SENTINELS" in Yellow letters. Attached below the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "213TH SPACE WARNING SQ" in Yellow letters.

### **EMBLEM SIGNIFICANCE**

Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The mountains suggest the majestic depth of the Air Force to defend its homeland. The grid lines of the demi-globe represent the purity of the effort to maintain

global peace. The North Star represents the vastness of the unit mission responsibility to monitor space approaches. The bugle and strap embody the mission mandate of perfect early warning to help maintain Air Force global objectives.
