EMBLEM

On a disc Azure, in sinister a radar scope Vert, detailed Sable, the sweep finder pointing to sinister chief of the third surmounted on sinister side by an air traffic control tower of the like, lighted Argent, overall a silhouette of a bucking bronco and rider holding a hat overhead in his sinister hand Or, all within a diminished border of the third. Attached above the disc, a White scroll edged with a narrow Black border and inscribed "243D ATCS" in Black letters. Attached below the disc, a White scroll edged with a narrow Black border and inscribed "FIRST THERE ON THE AIR" in Black letters.

EMBLEM SIGNIFICANCE

Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The radar screen signifies the unit's ability for swiftness and protection. The bucking bronco alludes to the strength, readiness and fortitude of the Wyoming Air National Guard. The air traffic control tower represents the unit's ability to provide safe and dependable air traffic control services.
