OPERATIONS

In 2006, the 315 AMXS continued to outperform the competition. They received the Outstanding Non-flying Unit Award and had zero safety findings during the 2006 Logistics Standardization and Evaluation Program (LSEP) Inspection. One of the squadron members was recognized by the Charleston Metro Chamber of Commerce for his years of volunteer service to family, community and country.

C-17 airlift support is critical to the Global War on Terrorism and once again the 315 AMXS has delivered. Setting a new Charleston record of 15,396 missions, 151,283 passengers and 102,770 tons of cargo equating to 39% worldwide missions and 36% C-17 organic cargo! We proudly participated in the launching of a historic 100% on time 17 - ship formation - the largest C-17 launch from one base. They worked proudly with active duty to preserve our AMC history through the refurbishing of our static display C-47 and C-141 to their original paint scheme.

As an augmentation force, their prime focus is training. Through the persistent efforts of flight chiefs, section supervisors and training monitors we have maintained a better than 99 percent training currency, while providing thousands of mandays of support to the 437 MXG. They performed a flawless execution of a real-world disaster in August when they performed a hurricane evacuation (HUREVAC) of their assets in a mere 13 hours, moving them out of the path of Tropical Storm Ernesto. With a squadron of 450 members, they are focused to ensure their members are trained and ready, whenever and wherever they are called to serve. As reservists they are at Charleston AFB two days a month and 15 days per year, in order to remain proficient and to safely work on aircraft. They remain committed to training reservists to their utmost potential while continually exceeding the standard.

When the 437 AMXS Commander and Maintenance Operations Officer deployed, reservists stepped up and filled these positions seamlessly; another great utilization of resources! Over the last three years they have had approximately 110 reservists working here at Charleston each year in a support capacity, along side our active duty counterparts. Over the last year we have had a total of 105 reservists deployed for over 3,116 days.

Since the completion of the mini C-17, the Spirit of Hope, Liberty and Freedom, their members have relentlessly volunteered to cover its ever demanding schedule. They continually utilize this
