# **EMBLEM**



Azure, on a pall Argent a fillet pall Gules, surmounted by two wings in lure Or detailed Sable, overall a flight symbol palewise point to chief Silver Gray, detailed Black, all within a narrow border Yellow. Attached above the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "AUXILIUM NULLUM SECUNDUM" in Yellow letters. Attached below the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "910TH OPERATIONS SUPPORT SQ" in Yellow letters. SIGNIFICANCE: Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The pall and fillet pall are taken from the parent wing's flag. The wings allude to the vigilance and protection of aircraft assets. The delta signifies the striving for perfection in accomplishing the mission. (Approved, 22 Jan 2004)

The emblem is symbolic of the unit's mission. Ultramarine blue represents the sky and the theater of Air Force operations. Air Force yellow represents the skills required of Air Force personnel. The silver gray spear point, or dagger, represents razor sharp execution of the unit mission and professionalism of trained unit personnel. The deltoid pointed skyward illustrates the goal of soaring upward and beyond in mission accomplishment. The symbol also displays the effort to strive for perfection. Furthermore, the spear point exemplifies flight and the Air Force mission in the air and beyond. The yellow drooping wings allude to compassion, vigilance and protection of aircraft assets provided by unit personnel. The white and crimson "Y", adopted from the wing insignia, also represents the fork in the road between the ordinary and extraordinary performance and adaptation by the unit's trained professionals.

The Dagger Form (superimposed over the deltoid) signifies razor sharp execution of our duties and responsibilities. It also signifies a "hands on" approach to carrying out those same duties and responsibilities. The Deltoid provides the emblem with positive motion. It points to the sky signifying a constant strive upward. The form has also been used to signify the "tip of the spear". The form itself is sleek and efficient, qualities desired of any organization. Its triangular shape is symbolic of the strength required to provide a strong support platform. Its shape is also reminiscent of a plane form. The shape of the wings depicts those of a guardian angel. They symbolize guidance, constant vigilance and protection. Wings also symbolize critical support as is evidenced by any aircraft or bird. The Red and White figure behind the winged deltoid is a reasonable depiction of our Wing's emblem. It is also symbolic of a fork in the road, signifying the constant change in direction that we confront on a daily basis in an ever-evolving world. This reminds us that change is inevitable and in order to be successful we must effectively adapt.
