## EMBLEM



Azure, a globe Celeste gridlined Sable charged with a cross Gules winged Or, above an arc of seven mullets in diminishing size from sinister Argent; all within a diminished bordure per bordure Blue and White. Attached below the disc a White scroll edged with a narrow Blue border. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Blue and yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The globe represents the worldwide medical care provided by the unit. The red cross and wings denote the humanitarian! life-saving mission of the squadron and the speed with which the unit personnel accomplish their tasks. The seven stars symbolize the unit's ability to provide day and night service, seven days a week. (Approved, 16 Apr 1996)

The emblem is symbolic of the unit and its mission. At disk center is a winged red cross representing the humanitarian, life-saving mission of the unit. It is superimposed over a globe representing medical care provided around the world. Seven increasingly larger stars symbolize the seven-day-a-week, day-and-night mission of the unit. A streaming arrow alludes to swiftness in providing aeromedical evacuation. Ultramarine blue and yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue of the disk background, lines of longitude and latitude and disk border represent the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Air Force yellow of the spread wings represents the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. Red of the cross refers to courage and bloodshed in times of peace as well as war. The light blue of the globe attests to dedication to the mission by unit personnel. White is used to denote the qualities of purity of purpose and perfection in the performance of duties.
