## **OPERATIONS**

The Kansas-Missouri floods during the summer of 1951 were severe. SB-29s and SA-16s from the 4th with other United States Air Force aircraft, dropped 200 tons of food, blankets, and medical supplies to the victims.

A helicopter crew from Flight B, 4th AR Squadron, flew medical personnel to 37 villages and settlements in Costa Rica, resulting in the inoculation of 978 persons, arresting a five-month yellow fever epidemic. Sep 1951
