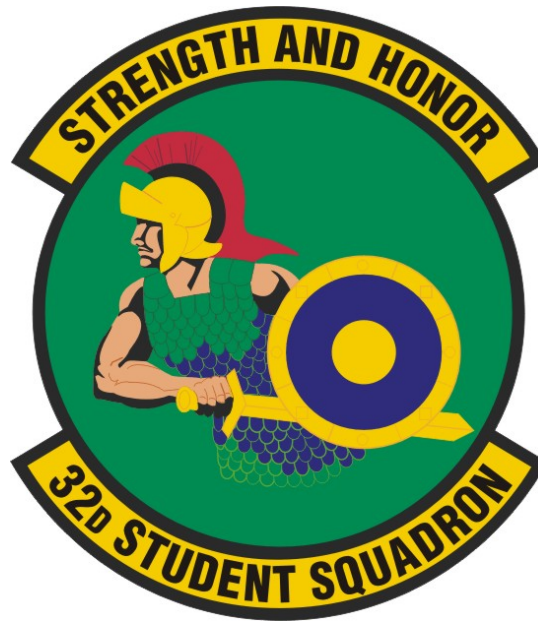

EMBLEM



On a disc Vert, the representation of a Roman Centurion leaning toward dexter, skin Proper shadows Sable, helmet Or, crest of the second with bristles Gules, breastplate of the field shaded Azure, drawing a sword with dexter hand from behind a circular shield borne on the sinister arm Yellow, displaying an annulet of the fifth, all within a narrow border Black. Attached above the disc, a Yellow scroll edged with a narrow Black border and inscribed "STRENGTH AND HONOR" in Black letters. Attached below the disc, a Yellow scroll edged with a narrow Black border and inscribed "32D STUDENT SQUADRON" in Black letters. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The Roman Centurion soldier, with sword and shield, represents the discipline for supervising the fighting on the field and the leadership they exhibit in keeping the army running smoothly, and here represents the SOS instructor.
