EMBLEM

44 Maintenance Support Squadron emblem: On an ultramarine blue disc within a narrow yellow border, a white armored hand that is detailed supporting a white missile. The key is yellow and the atoms red with yellow orbits. Below a black scroll bordered yellow. **SIGNIFICANCE:** The emblem is symbolic of the squadron and its mission. Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The gauntlet with key symbolizes the unit's key role in support of national defense through administration, training, and production control of maintenance on intercontinental ballistic missiles as denoted by the missile and nuclear symbol.
