## EMBLEM



9 Reconnaissance Technical Squadron patch



9 Intelligence Support Squadron emblem: Blue and yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The eagle represents the unit's functions to analyze, process, and report intelligence data derived from high altitude reconnaissance sensors. The eagle is perched on a demi-globe and grasps an olive branch indicating the importance of intelligence data in maintaining worldwide peace. The film and electronic flash denote the

squadron's support to various commands in disseminating photographic and electro-optical reconnaissance imagery and intelligence products, and also reflect the unit's operation of a certified airborne imagery processing facility. The sword denotes the importance of intelligence gathering and dissemination in defense activities. (Approved, 1 Jul 1992)

## **OPERATIONS**

The 9 Reconnaissance Technical Squadron programmed the flight track and specialized cameras on the onboard computer system of the SR-71; it processed the film taken from the U-2 and SR-71 when it returned; and then analyzed and interpreted the imagery.

The 9 Intelligence Squadron has participated in Operations IRAQI FREEDOM, ENDURING FREEDOM, and SOUTHERN WATCH in recent years. The unit developed over 325 miles of film and produced over 3500 imagery products in support of these operations. The search area covered by these missions was greater than 20 million square miles.
