EMBLEM



On a disc Azure (Graphite Blue), issuant from base a demi-globe Azure (Ultramarine Blue), land mass Brunn, horizon Argent, in chief an array of nine mullets of the last, overall a Rod of Asclepius Or, detailed Sable, highlighted of the fourth, all within a narrow border Yellow. Attached above the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "SUPER ET PRAETER" in Yellow letters. Attached below the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "9 AMDS" in Yellow letters. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The nine stars symbolize the 9 RW/MDG/AMDS. The Rod of Asclepius represents the physiologic and aeromedical challenges inherent in the mission the unit supports. The horizon between the sky and earth is a

representation of how the atmosphere appears from high altitude, along with the figurative representation of the "thin line" that protects members of the Squadron. The Latin motto, "SUPER ET PRAETER," translates to "Above and Beyond" in English and represents the nature of high-altitude ISR missions the unit supports, as well as the service the Squadron aspires to deliver. OPERATIONS

The 9 Aerospace Medicine Squadron maintains the capability to support the 9th Reconnaissance Wing ISR mission by keeping Beale Airmen healthy, fit, and ready for global operations. It provides comprehensive flight medicine, dental and optometric care to treat and prevent disease. 9 AMDS personnel ensure safe workplaces, food, water, and facilities for 10,000 workers and beneficiaries. They promote wellness and delivers health education to the Beale community. Lastly, 9 AMDS provides highly trained, motivated medics for world-wide contingency operations. There are 74 active duty, civilian and contract members assigned to 9 AMDS. The unit consists of six primary functions: Flight Medicine, Public Health, Bioenvironmental Engineering, Dental, Optometry and the Health and Wellness Center.
