MISSION

The 55 Communications Group provides superior C4 and Knowledge Management services for the 55 Wing, USSTRATCOM, the Air Force Weather Agency, and over 47 other tenant organizations at Offutt AFB, as well as cyber operations support for numerous Air Force and Department of Defense installations and missions.

There are over 600 military, defense civilian, and contractor personnel operating and maintaining arguably the Air Force's most diverse array of cyber systems to include multiple military satellite communications platforms, secure and non-secure voice, data and radio frequency networks, one-of-a-kind air traffic control and landing systems, hundreds of miles of fiber optic and copper cabling, as well as providing base-wide client systems, information assurance and knowledge operations services.

The 55 CG also provides unprecedented Nuclear Command and Control (NC2) capabilities via operations and maintenance of the Strategic Automated Command and Control System (SACCS) and other NC2 systems, in addition to its operations and maintenance of USSTRATCOM's Alternate Missile Warning Center systems.

In all, the 55 Communication Squadron and 55 Strategic Communication Squadron operate numerous cyber centers, including eight 24/7, providing a range of services from text messaging and electronic mail for Offutt Air Force Base to Emergency Action Messages for the Secretary of Defense and President of the United States. EMBLEM



1 Aerospace Communications Wing emblem: Azure, in fess a lightning flash bend sinisterwise or, in sinister chief four mullets one, two and one argent and in dexter base a flight symbol bendwise gules, all within a diminished border of the second. **SIGNIFICANCE:** The emblem is symbolic of the wing and its mission. Against a sky-blue shield representing the vast realm of Air Force activity, a lightning bolt of three segments represents the three squadrons of the wing and symbolizes the

wing's communications link of command to the force. The four stars signify command and the flight symbol represents the Strategic Air Command force. Thus, the entire emblem represents the link of communications provided by the 1 Aerospace Communications Wing from the Commander-in-Chief, to the Strategic Air Command force. OPERATIONS

The primary mission of the 1st Aerospace Communications Group-Command was to install, maintain, and operate all communications facilities for Headquarters Strategic Air Command and for organizations on Offutt AFB. The unit monitored the world-wide communications networks for Strategic Air Command and supported the Strategic Air Command underground and airborne command posts. The 1st Aerospace Communications Group trained and maintained crypto communication teams for the Strategic Air Command Airborne Command Post; the Nightwatch E-4A/B.
