#### **EMBLEM**

On a disc Azure, a stylized crouching man Argent, detailed Argent (Silver Gray) and Sable supporting a sphere of the first, edged and gridlined Or bearing a stylized tooth of the second detailed of the third and fimbriated of the fourth, all within an orle rope of the fifth; all within a narrow border Blue. Attached above the disc, a White scroll edged with a narrow Blue border and inscribed "CLAUSUS ORBIS" in Blue letters. Attached below the disc, a White scroll edged with a narrow Blue border and inscribed "59TH DENTAL SUPPORT SQ" in Blue letters. **SIGNIFICANCE** Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The tooth represents the unit's core function of dentistry. White signifies purity and healing. The man depicts the strength and support for worldwide dentistry as portrayed by the tooth within the globe. The circular rope denotes the Squadron motto, "CLAUSUS ORBIS," which is Latin for "CLOSE THE LOOP." The motto reminds unit members to diligently and proactively engage in every assigned task and attend to it from beginning to end to the satisfaction of those who assigned the task.
