EMBLEM



A disc with a yellow section at left and a smaller blue section at right, separated by a rainbow arched from upper left to lower right composed of five colors from left to right as follows: blue, light blue, red, orange, yellow; at lower center a red cross and at center overall a white Pegasus in flight to the left detailed and outlined blue; on the blue section at right, in a line following the arc of the rainbow four white five-pointed stars, all within a narrow blue border. Attached at top of the disc a yellow scroll edged and inscribed in blue with the words "IN TIME OF NEED", and at the bottom a blank scroll. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Pegasus symbolizes strength and courage and alludes to the pride of Unit's members in the US Air Force Reserve and their striving for excellence. The rainbow symbolizes relief and calm after a storm. It also represents the versatility of the Unit's members. The Red Cross represents the international symbol of medical personnel and care. The blue and yellow field symbolizes day and night and signify no limit to the service given by members of the Unit. It also alludes to taking wounded from "night into daylight."
