EMBLEM



63 Troop Carrier Squadron



Against a blue background, from an upright horseshoe white markings blue, outlined black, a caricatured jenny (member of the horse family); the jenny tan, with a "horse-laugh" expression, teeth white and yellow, tongue red, eyeballs white, all detail and outlines black, wearing a sailor-style hat, yellow, banded white and red, jauntily tipped on the head with elongated ears protruding from the brim, tan, shaded red, a ribbon red caught under the chin and tied in a bowknot. "Flying Jennies" symbolizes the primary mission of the organization transportation. The jenny is not one of the more beautiful members of the horse family, nor is it comparable in speed and sleekness to the thoroughbred race horse, however, its dependability, workload accomplishments, long work life, and its ability to travel and complete the mission assigned under all conditions, adversities notwithstanding, is unquestionable. While the thoroughbreds gain fame and glory with their great speed, the jenny though less Glamourous fieraided by the working man as the champion. The jauntily tipped hat atop the queen's head depicts the high esprit de corps of the squadron. The hatband, eyecatch and "touch" of all hats is representative of the squadron colors red and white stripes. The joviality of the jenny characterizes the manner in which the organization undertakes and completes its mission, realizing all the time that newspaper headlines will be few, but the necessity of their "behind the scene accomplishments toward the overall "job well done". The flowing ears give the impression of complete airworthiness. Finally, the upright jenny shoes, against the Air Force blue background, is a good-luck charm, characteristic of the past accomplishments and the "knowing hope" of the continued success in the future of all tasks undertaken by this organization.









On a disc Azure, issuing out of and over an upright horseshoe Argent, detailed of the field fimbriated Sable, the caricatured head of a "Jenny" bay with "horse-laugh" expression langued Gules, teeth alternating White and Yellow, wearing white spectacles detailed Black and a sailor-style hat Or, banded Red and White, tipped on the head with elongated ears protruding from the brim Proper shaped of the fifth and a ribbon caught under the chin and tied in a bow knot of the last, all within a diminished bordure Blue. Attached above the disc, a White scroll edged with a narrow Blue border and inscribed "63D AIR REFUELING SQ" in Blue letters. Attached below the disc, a White scroll edged with a narrow Blue border and inscribed "FLYING JENNIES" in Blue letters. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Blue and yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The "Flying Jennies" represent transportation, the primary mission of the unit. The hat stands for the high esprit de corps of the squadron. The hatband is for the red and white colors of the unit. The horseshoe is a good-luck charm, characteristic of past accomplishments and continued future success. (Approved, 20 Oct 1952)
