64 Aerial Port Squadron emblem

64 Aerial Port Squadron emblem: a brittany azure globe, highlighted with ultramarine azure longitude and latitude lines is centered on a sable disc. Three arrows, which are or, gules and tenne encircle the globe in a clockwise direction. Argent lines orbit the globe and arrows from chief to base and from dexter to sinister. Twenty four estoilles encircle the globe on the field of sable. The disc is bordered with brittany azure. Two ultramarine azure scrolls are attached above and below the disc. The scroll above is blank. The one below is lettered with white and bears the unit's motto "GLOBAL READINESS". **SIGNIFICANCE:** Ultramarine blue and air force yellow are used in the design. Blue represents the sky, the primary theater of air force operations. Yellow represents the sun and the excellence required of air force personnel. The globe depicts the worldwide operational capability of aerial porters. The three arrows encircling the glove allude to the twenty-four hour a day aerial port operations. The twenty four stars bordering the glove illustrate the unit's around-the-clock operations. The orbital lines sweeping around the globe depict the worldwide aeronautical transportation network which carries the product of the unit's labors. (Approved, 2 Oct 1991)
