EMBLEM



Over and through a medium blue disc, a caricatured pelican light blue, white, and black, bill and feet yellow, wearing brown aviator's goggles, diving toward sinister base, dumping out one of three red aerial bombs, trimmed black, held in pouch of bill, all emitting white speed lines to rear. (Approved, 12 Jul 1943)

Eluding of European skies by American made bombers attests to the growing concern that may well be felt by Axis pirateers. To the sterling worth of Uncle Sam's personnel and materials, the resolute sky fighters of the Royal Air Force have had occasion to pay tribute. After having been practically blasted to bits during a recent windmill height operation over Nazi-occupied Holland, an American bomber and crew landed safely back in England. When the 67 Bombardment Squadron was grouped at Barksdale Field, Shreveport, La., its desire for appropriate insigne was supplied by artists of the Walt Disney Studios. The duties of its personnel as bombardiers, machine gunners, radio operators and navigators was thought to be best expressed in composite interpretation by a huge pelican adept at traveling long distances, carrying bombs in his beak and unloading them at will on enemy targets.



67 Strategic Missile Squadron (ICBM-Minuteman) On a blue disc bordered yellow a white missile descending to dexter base with black markings mounted by a white pelican with black markings and details, yellow beak and feet, red tongue, wearing brown goggles and trailing white arched vapor trails. Attached below the disc a blank white scroll edged yellow. **SIGNIFICANCE:** The pelican represents the state bird of Louisiana, the state in which the squadron received its training. His characteristics symbolize ruggedness, determination, ability to carry heavy loads, and endurance. The missile represents today's weaponry and the fact that the squadron is charged with maintaining combat readiness to conduct strategic missile warfare. (Approved, 26 Aug 1968)
