#### **MISSION**

The 90 Security Forces Group is composed of five squadrons. The 790 Missile Security Forces Squadron provides security for convoys and missile maintenance operations. The 90 Ground Combat Training Squadron is located at Camp Guernsey in Guernsey, Wyo., and provides security, pre-deployment, and antiterrorism/force protection training for USAF personnel. The 90 Missile Security Forces Squadron provides security for 15 missile alert facilities and 150 launch facilities. The 90 Security Forces Squadron provides installation and weapons storage area security; police services; pass and registration functions; and reports and analysis duties. The 90 Security Support Squadron provides command and control for the missile field and access control for all missile field forces as well as all security forces training and equipment support.

### **OPERATIONS**

Thirty-seven new airmen joined the 90 Security Forces Group at F.E. Warren AFB, Wyo., in late December as part of ongoing efforts to bulk up readiness, which has suffered as fewer airmen are pushed to work longer hours to compensate for a manning gap. "We currently do not have enough manning for every flight to post out 100 percent," said MSgt. Robert Wilson, 90 Missile Security

Forces Squadron flight chief. "In order to make up for that, we pull what we call a standby; essentially, our airmen are made to work an extra one-to-two days with other flights to meet mandatory posting requirements ... When you are on your fourth or fifth day in a row of 12 hour shifts, you get to a state where you may not be as alert or motivated to do your absolute best." As part of the Force Improvement Program, all three USAF missile wing bases are undergoing a realignment of their missile field security. The 37 first-term airmen arrived at F.E. Warren from technical training school, and while they will require training, they also "will afford relief in instances where airmen pulling 'standbys,' or additional days in the field, no longer have to do so," said MSgt. Vincent Bolden, 90 MSFS weapons systems security non-commissioned officer in charge.

The 90 Security Forces Group at F.E. Warren AFB, Wyo., added 37 airmen to its ranks as part of Air Force-wide efforts to bolster the number of security forces that protect the nation's ICBM fields, according to a base release. These airmen completed their unit orientation training in late December and will now be part of Warren's 90 Missile Security Forces Squadron, states the release. Additional airmen will arrive later to fill out the security forces group. Manning shortages among nuclear security forces have placed added burdens on airmen in this career field, impacting morale. "When you are on your fourth or fifth day in a row of 12-hour shifts, you get to a state where you may not be as alert or motivated to do your absolute best," said MSgt. Robert Wilson, 90 MSFS flight chief. "This affects readiness, as this is when mistakes start to happen: vehicle accidents, forgetting gear, not following proper procedures, etc.," he said. The influx of airmen will help alleviate those strains, states the Dec. 30 release. 2015
