EMBLEM



92nd Civil Engineering Squadron emblem: Blue and yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence

required of Air Force personnel. The gear wheel and the construction helmet with the tools represents the maintenance and construction functions of the unit. The compass denotes engineering functions. The fireman's helmet and tools are representative of the firefighting section of the Squadron. The aircraft silhouette represents the maintenance of runways. The airman's helmet and rifle symbolize military preparedness. The circle denotes unity and around the clock operations, while the wreath represents honor and valor in defense of peace.

92nd Civil Engineer Squadron emblem: On a disc Argent, on a dust cloud Silver Gray, a charging bull affronté Gules detailed of the last, hooves Sable, horned of the first and eyed Or, irises of the third, all within a narrow border Blue. Attached above the disc, a White scroll edged with a narrow Blue border and inscribed "LEAD THE CHARGE" in Blue letters. Attached below the disc, a White scroll edged with a narrow Blue border and inscribed "92D CIVIL ENGINEER SQ" in Blue letters. Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The bull signifies the unit's ties to the USAF Civil Engineering "Prime Beef" and reflects the determination and drive to be in the forefront of mission accomplishment.
