EMBLEM

On an ultramarine blue disc, a white shield in base, winged golden orange, the shield bearing the Arabic numeral "10" ultramarine blue, all below a white five pointed star charged with a red disc, encircled by a white annulet. (Approved, 25 Jan 1944; revised, 13 Jan 1977)

A white shield with golden orange wings charged with the Arabic number "10" in blue below a white star 11/16 inch (1.75 cm) in diameter with a red disc in the center within a 1/16 inch (.16 cm) white annulet 13/16 inch (2.06 cm) in diameter, all on blue disc 2 3/4 inches (6.99 cm) in diameter.

Symbolism

The colors are those of the Army Air Forces. The number ten indicates the numerical designation of the organization, while the winged shield and the white star with a red center indicate that the organization is a part of the Army Air Forces.

Background

The shoulder sleeve insignia was approved on 25 January 1944.

EMBLEM SIGNIFICANCE

OPERATIONS

Activated for air operations in the China-India-Burma (CBI) theater; commanded tactical units from Mar 1942-Dec 1943, then served as a strategic bombardment headquarters in the CBI; later, resumed command over tactical fighter units in June 1944 until August 1945, when it conducted primarily air transport and troop carrier missions through the end of its operations in December 1945. Following WWII, initially conducted air defense operations and training beginning in the late 1940s, then later concentrated on air reserve training throughout the 1950s. Responsible for air defense and early warning forces based in the northern central and later southern central U.S. from 1966-1969. From 1976, exercised intermediate command over reserve component flying training, fighter, bomber, air refueling, rescue, space and special operations forces.

Brig. Gen. Richard Scobee will become commander of 10th Air Force, one of Air Force Reserve Command's three numbered air forces, announced the command on July 7. He will succeed Maj. Gen. William Binger, who has led 10th AF since November 2011. Headquartered at NAS Fort Worth JRB, Texas, 10th AF oversees AFRC's cyber, space, special operations, strike, and intelligence, surveillance, and reconnaissance assets. 2014
