

## 1 SPECIAL OPERATIONS FORCE SUPPORT SQUADRON



### MISSION

The 1 Special Operations Force Support Squadron provides administrative control for approximately 700 military and civilian personnel, manages 90 base facilities, and supports more than 40,000 active duty, reservists, civilians, families, and retirees in the local community. The unit also provides essential human services to the Hurlburt community through a wide variety of activities, facilities, and programs to include child care, before-and-after school youth programs, family daycare, dining facilities, lodging, outdoor recreation, golf course, library services, bowling, base honor guard, mortuary affairs, equipment rental, fitness centers, arts and crafts center, education center and Airmen and Family Readiness Center.

The 1 Special Operations Force Support Squadron evolved from the Air Force directed mergers of base Mission Support Squadrons and Services Squadrons. The merger reduced the number of flights from 12 to 11; reducing overhead.
